

EDUCATIONAL ACCESS & PATHWAYS







NBPS now has an interpretation line to facilitate two-way communication between our schools and parents! This interpretation line, a high-quality telephone interpretation service provided by Lionbridge, is used for parents to connect with Teachers/School. Interpreters are fast and professional over the phone, and make interacting simple.

All schools have received flyers with this information. The flyers are customized for your school with your school's extension. Every school was sent both hard copies of these flyers, as well as jpg format, making it easier for staff to send through text messages, Bloomz, Class Dojo, etc.

This interpretation line can be used for parent-teacher conferences, emergency calls, nurse questions, attendance follow-ups, etc. The blue colored flyer is for staff use and the orange color flyer which is translated in English, Spanish, Portuguese and K'iche is for parents.

We encourage school secretaries (School Liaison) to get acquainted with this

service and practice the staff steps listed. Once Staff has familiarized themselves with this interpretation line, they can then connect our families with these services.

It is also very simple for our families to use these services! They simply dial the NBPS phone number 508-997-4511 and when prompted, they dial the extension of the child's school. When they are welcomed by the school secretary, they simply say the language that they are comfortable speaking and that an interpreter is needed.

The parent/guardian will be put on a brief hold while the secretary connects to our interpreter line. When the secretary returns, whey will be in a conference call with the school and the interpreter and may now explain the reason for the call in the language they have asked for.

Announcing the Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Program!

Dear Elementary School Teachers of New Bedford,

Since its recent establishment in 2019, New Bedford's Farm to School Program has worked to ensure that all students in the district have access to food that supports the entirety of their needs, both mentally and physically. In doing so, the program hopes to connect students to foods that are culturally appropriate, locally sourced, and nutritious.

This year, New Bedford's Farm to School Program is excited to implement the Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Program (FFVP) in all elementary schools across the district. The FFVP is a federally funded program that provides fruit and vegetable snacks to students during the school day. By introducing students to a wide variety of fruits and vegetables, the FFVP aims to improve students' attitudes towards healthy foods and to increase their consumption of them.

In the development of children's food preferences, it is immensely important that they are exposed early to as many fresh fruits and vegetables as possible. Getting used to trying new things at a young age can help a student's vitamin intake, lifelong habits, and overall health. While we can start to facilitate the connection between NBPS students and healthy foods by providing the FFVP, we are hoping for your help as teachers to encourage your students to participate throughout the year.

As the program gets rolled out, we will include the FFVP snack with students' take-home meals, whether from in-person school or from one of our Grab 'n Go locations. Students will soon start to see the FFVP snack included with their meals twice a week. They are welcome to eat their snack at school if they are there, or they can take it home and enjoy it there. Either way, we hope that you can help us to create a district-wide culture of food positivity and to foster excitement among your students about trying new things!

Food and Nutrition Services Dept Awarded Grant to Improve Food Security

In October, the NBPS Food and Nutrition Services (FNS) department was awarded three grants totaling 1.4 million dollars from the Baker-Polito Administration to improve food security in New Bedford. The funds will be used to improve FNS infrastructure allowing for greater ability to conduct emergency meal service.

Specific plans entail a renovation and redesign project of the High School FNS operation. The NBHS kitchen and four serving pods will be completely redesigned, allowing the NBHS kitchen to serve as a second Central Kitchen in the district. This project will include increased capacity for storage including dry goods, frozen and refrigerated items, as well as state-of-the-art packing equipment that will allow for on-site packing of fresh meals.

NBPS Farm to School Program Launches Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Program at all Elementary Schools

Last school year the department ran a pilot of the Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Program at two elementary schools in the district. The goal of the program is to connect students to foods that are culturally appropriate, locally sourced, and nutritious.

This school year, after being awarded an additional \$485,000 federal grant, the program has been expanded to all elementary schools in the district. This funding allows the department to provide an additional serving of a fresh fruit or vegetable twice a week to all elementary school students. The grant has also supported the addition of two <u>Food Corps</u> service members in the district.

The Food Corps service members, Keri Cusson and Mikaela Thiboutot, work to support the Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Program at Jacobs, Gomes, Hayden McFadden and Pacheco Elementary Schools, where they plan to work directly with students in their classrooms, gardens, cafeterias, or remotely to connect them with healthy food.
